The tournament

or the last three days, from Friday, June 30 to Sunday, July 2nd, Raleigh, the capital of the State of North Carolina became the center of attention of the US Congolese Diaspora. All eyes, all ears, all attention were directed to what was going here.

The reason was simple:

Each year all soccer teams of the Congolese decedents who are scattered around the country come together in celebration of the Congolese Independence day. This event has nothing to do with politics or the plights of social injustices going on in the country of Congo, back home. Instead, this Soccer tournament, started a couple years ago has become a venue of social interaction, fellowship and togetherness. It conveys a message and a since of belonging to something among the new generation that is taking over, slowly, the leadership of their respective communities.

For this year celebration, twelve soccer teams have shown their commitment to participate. With the last minutes of preparation, ten soccer teams made it to the tournament:

The tournament is the culmination of a well organized event involving money and commitment among the teams. Games were played for two full days (Saturday and Sunday). The last two teams standings, Charlotte and FC Bondeko of Raleigh, both of North Carolina teams fought for the championship. This game full of drama reminded everyone of the historic competition that always involved both cities. Before the game starts, Raleigh players recognized that Charlotte as a

team, remained a fierce competitor and a tough team to beat, but by the end, the FC Bondeko just displayed its superiority by showing everybody of the ingredients they're made.

The sole Charlotte goal came as of penalty while Raleigh has one penalty of their own, in addition to two magnificent plays that ended in two magnificent goals to seal the win with the official score: Charlotte 1 - Raleigh 3


Recognizing the hard work

presentation to be presented and showcased to the winning team, but to proceed on a various recognitions among players, organizers and all the participants that made this whole tournament a successful one.


